How Does a Weary World Rejoice?



The Christmas season is filled with emotions. There's the wonder of a child opening their presents, nostalgia for traditions of Christmases past, the peace and awe of a sanctuary filled with candlelight, and grief for empty seats at the table. In the Biblical Christmas story, there is the joy of the angels, Zechariah's fear at encountering an angel, Mary's perplexity, the wonder of the shepherds, and the generosity of the magi.

This year as we journey through the Advent season and prepare for Christmas, we are focusing on the question, *How does a weary world rejoice?*. Through this series, we are exploring some of those familiar human emotions present in both the Christmas story and our own experience: Isolation, fear, and disbelief, as well as connection, trust, and joy.

Maybe you're coming to this season feeling weary. As I write this, there is a truce in the fighting in Gaza, but it's unclear how long it might last. The war in Ukraine seems to be mired in a bloody stalemate. We are living in a global climate crisis. People we know are facing long-term and acute medical issues. We have neighbors struggling to make ends meet. It's hard to see how our present issues with poverty, violence, racism, greed, discrimination, inequality, and so many more things will be resolved. No wonder so many are feeling weary!

Ministry Spotlight: Family Promise

On Christ the King Sunday, we heard Jesus talk about the importance of loving the least of these in his name. As churches, one of the ways we answer that call to love and serve our neighbors in tangible ways is through our partnership with Family Promise of Ozaukee County. Through their emergency shelter, rent assistance program, and case management services, Family Promise works to reduce homelessness and help families regain housing, independence, and their dignity. Over 195 households have been helped so far this year.

In January 2023, Family Promise opened the new Portlight Shelter on Sunset Road in Port Washington. The shelter has eight sleeping rooms, along with community rooms, a kitchen, and gathering spaces to help with financial literacy and rehabilitation. Over 2,300



nights of shelter have already been provided through the shelter. Around twenty local churches, including ours, support Family Promise by providing meals for families staying at the shelter.

Jan Nealy calls our partnership "an opportunity to be involved in the community and use the talents our members have to share food and to step up at a time when more and more people are in need." She also points out that in addition to the specific weeks when our congregations provide meals, "They have one day slots too - you can sign up as an individual and serve just one meal, rather than a whole week."

Alex Pieper says, "What I love about Family Promise is that it is up close and personal. Our volunteers are not only making meals but eating those meals with the people we are serving-it makes it more rewarding."

A Note on Stewardship

Looking to support our ministry without affecting your monthly budget? If you are 70½ years or older and have a traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA), you are likely eligible to contribute to our congregation tax-free directly from your IRA. This is a great way to benefit our ministry as a congregation while avoiding paying taxes on any Required Minimum Distributions. Talk to your financial advisor or IRA custodian to direct a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to your church.



Lighthouse Youth Ministry

As 2023 draws to a close, we are so grateful for all the ways God has been at work through Lighthouse this year. After some time off this summer we have enjoyed getting back into the swing of things with bi-weekly Sunday evening programming. Students enjoyed fun activities like a painting night, bonfire, and "Friendsgiving" celebration with a breakfast themed potluck. We welcomed guest speaker, Carole Hynes, from the National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) to share about mental health, and completed our 2nd annual "Trick-or-Treat so Others Can Eat" event, collecting more than 200 lbs in food for the Ozaukee Food Alliance.

And of course, a big highlight for the fall was bringing back the Giving Tuesday Spaghetti Supper and Silent Auction fundraiser. This event took place on November 28th and was a huge success! We had a great turnout, the food was delicious, live music from Bella Musik added a cozy and festive feel to the event, and we had 126 fabulous auction items up for grabs. A HUGE thank you to everyone who attended, contributed auction items, supplied desserts and other food supplies, and helped promote our event. We estimate we raised approximately \$10,000, which we will use to continue investing in the lives of the youth of our communities!

Beyond our own needs, we have committed as a congregation to tithe 10% of what we raise to our synod's *Equipping the Saints Mission Appeal*, which is providing innovation grants to congregations, training and equipping leaders for ministry in this changing world, supporting Lutheran churches in El Salvador and Tanzania, and more. baptisms all the way back to 1963. Did you know our congregation has celebrated over 430 baptisms in our history? Of course, we will also add each person baptized here in the years to come!
