Volunteer Spotlight

Paula Davison

Paula works behind the scenes each week to prepare the contents of grocery bags that go out to clients. The bags contain shelf stable products. Paula thoughtfully reviews what the pantry has available and tries to coordinate items that compliment each other, like pasta and sauce, peanut butter and jelly, or something to create a dessert item. This job can sometimes be challenging when inventory is low. Paula also coordinates with our food manager to inform her as to which products are low and need restocking.

Liz Busateri

Liz is our 'check-in' person. This is the first place clients need to stop before shopping at the pantry. Liz uses a barcode scanner to check clients into our software system. When clients are new, she coordinates with others to get them registered. Liz also watches for clients with birthdays in order to distribute pre-prepared birthday gifts to them. Currently, Liz is making sure clients have an opportunity to sign up for Thanksgiving turkeys. Liz also serves as treasurer for the food pantry.

Shirley Groothousen

Shirley works in the product marking area. She and her team ensure that goods received have the correct 'best if used by' dates clearly marked on them. This helps them decide what can go into inventory, and what goes to the 'free' table, an area where foods that are expired or close to expiration. Clients are able take whatever they want from that table, after reading the posted information about expired foods.
