Schools Respond in Epic Fashion

Board member Sandra Pessaro, our liaison to schools, has been busy working with school leaders to inspire activities that can both feed the hungry and provide learning experiences for students. She first worked with Northern Ozaukee High School's Student Council to run a reverse collection for the pantry. Students were given a slip with a food item on it. The students then shopped for that item and brought it back to school. They collected nearly 100 pounds of food!

Next was the cereal collection at the elementary schools in Port Washington/Saukville, and holy cow, did they respond!

Staff, students, and parents at 3 schools donated over 1,000 boxes of cereal. Before they turned it over to us, they did a 'domino' experiment at each school.

It took our pantry van and 3 other vehicles to successfully pick up this generous donation, but it didn't end there. Once it was brought to the pantry and weighed, the job was only half done. There were shopping carts and boxes full of cereal everywhere!

We had a crew at the ready the following day to create space for this product, and get it marked and put away. It was a great job by all involved! All of this cereal should take us through the summer and perhaps beyond.

Way to go, Sandra, for your first and very successful school food drives. All of the schools said they're excited to collaborate again!



Students Learn About the Homeless

Students at Divine Savior School in Fredonia were learning about what it's like to be homeless. They built shelters and set up tents outside the school for a simulation.

We were grateful to be invited to speak to the students regarding what our pantry does to serve the homeless.

The importance of treating homeless clients with respect and compassion was emphasized. Information was given about the types of food containers that are convenient for people living in this situation. We also talked about household items that

would be important to have. We closed by talking about how we collaborate with other area agencies, like St. Vincent DePaul.

It was a pleasure speaking with the students, and we hope they were able to take away some new and helpful information.


Food Drives, Fundraisers & Events

2025 Food Donations/Purchases vs. Food Distribution




Pantry Collaborations
