

Wrestling with Doubt, Finding Faith

"Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshiped him, but they doubted." -Matthew 28:16-17




Do you wrestle with doubt? We may not admit it or talk about it very often, but I suspect we all have doubts and questions about faith. Even as Christians, we look around at the hurt and brokenness in this world, and we wonder where God is. We read the violence, patriarchy, and exclusion in the Bible, and wonder how all this can be God's word. We see the radically different opinions and views held by Christians, and wonder at the church's claim to be Christ's body.

It's important to know that having doubts does not imply a lack of faith. Rather, doubt is part of faith, because doubt means you're wrestling with faith. Doubt is a sign faith matters. United Methodist Pastor Adam Hamilton writes, "Doubt is not only natural, it is healthy, provided it spurs us on to further reflection and a search for what is true." Faith should be wrestled with, and we should question—and let's bring our questions to the One we trust to have the answers. One of my favorite sentences in the Bible is in Mark 9:24, where a father seeking healing for his son cries out, "I believe; help my unbelief!"

Often, I think when we're faced with big questions, questions about God's existence, about Jesus' resurrection, about the afterlife, we assume everyone else must have the answers. But the reality is we all are wrestling with these big questions of faith. Yet in church—in the exact community where we should feel safe digging in—we can just take them for granted.

This fall, we're going to spend six weeks beginning September 14 looking at big questions of faith like Is there a God? Is Heaven Real? The Good Book? Wrestling with the Bible, and more, in a sermon series called *Wrestling with Doubt, Finding Faith*, based on the book of the same title by Adam Hamilton.



These might not be the most comfortable questions to wrestle with (honestly, I'm a little nervous about preaching on some of these topics!), but I think they're honest questions. As Christians and as a church, we don't need to be afraid to honestly engage with tough topics. Instead of avoiding the big questions of life, instead of assuming everyone else must have it all figured out, let's wrestle with our doubts and questions together.

For some of these questions, there may not be a definitive answer for us to reach. The best we can do might be to accept that it's a mystery. But as we wrestle together, we can grow together. Questions and doubt are not the enemy of faith. They're the path to a deeper faith. I'm excited to go on this journey with you. See you in worship!

As a new school year begins, we are excited to kick off a new year of programming at Lighthouse as well! We had a great summer including a middle school service night in Milwaukee, a fun evening of worship at Lifest in Oshkosh, and of course, our week-long service trip to St. Louis!



The middle schoolers traveled to Milwaukee to serve dinner at the Guest House, which is a men's shelter. We assembled fruit and veggie cups and we took those with us to serve alongside pizza, soda, and desserts to the guests staying there. The boys worked hard and had a great time helping out, and afterwards we enjoyed the opportunity to tour the facility and learn more about the work they do to help those experiencing homelessness in Milwaukee.

In July, our small but mighty team of three high school youth and adults set off for St. Louis where we had the chance to partner with seven different service organizations in the community including food banks, a thrift store, an organic farm school, a child development center, and a furniture warehouse. We also had opportunities to learn more about some systemic issues in St. Louis such as racial inequality and socioeconomic divides in various neighborhoods that further exacerbate issues of poverty. In addition, we took time each day for worship and devotions and had time to explore the city and have some fun together as well at places like the City Museum, Union Station, and the Gateway Arch. It was an incredible trip, and be on the lookout this fall for the opportunity to see pictures and hear more stories from the trip participants during/after worship coming soon!

With a new program year just around the corner, I'm excited for what the year will bring as we continue to welcome, empower, and equip students to be all that God creates them to be. Looking Ahead Together

Christ the King started our mission and goals journey by holding three meetings for members to attend during a week in June: one in the morning, one at night and one on a Saturday morning. I also met individually with a few people who were unable to make one of the scheduled events. We were blessed with high attendance at the meetings. Thirty-six individuals gave their input on 5 questions: What brought you to CTK? What encouraged you to stay? What is most important to you about our congregation? What do you worry about most about CTK? What does CTK look like in 5 years? 10 years? And if you could wave a magic wand, what would you like to see at CTK?

Additionally, I spoke with the principal of the high school, a vice-principal at the junior high school, and the Director at Family Promise. I also attended an event at the Senior Center with the Mayor where I heard what citizens were saying as well as the concerns of the Mayor. Paul Hoffman talked with the police department.

Through this process, we have gathered a lot of information which will help us as a congregation to develop a new Mission Statement and goals for the next three years. The council has scheduled a **Visioning Conversation on September 13 from 9 am to 3 pm.** (We'll wrap up earlier if we complete our planning!) It is especially important for everyone in our congregation to give input and help with the development of our mission and goals--we're in this together! We will provide donuts in the morning and a lunch. Please RSVP with the QR code below.

Financial Summary

Through August, an income vs expense balance of -\$6,995 is due to \$7,696 in expenses for the accessible door (you might remember we received a grant for this in fall 2024) and \$4,990 for our new lawn mower.

The current general fund balance is \$41,578, and our mortgage balance is \$52,832. A major individual donation in June made up for offerings through May running below budgeted. Expenses have been significantly below budget.

The 2025 budget projected a \$34,265 deficit for the year, and our current track looks to be around a \$10-12K deficit.



Stone Soup

In one of the most well-known stories in Scripture, Jesus miraculously feeds a crowd of over 5,000 people with just five loaves and two fish. All four gospel writers tell this amazing story, but only John recounts where Jesus got the five loaves and two fish—from a little boy who was willing to offer his lunch to Jesus. As that story demonstrates, God can do amazing things when we offer even a little bit of what we have.

Our church feeds our neighbors by making Stone Soup. A few ingredients, some faithful volunteers, and God uses what we offer to make a difference in our community. Stone Soup is made every other Saturday (see ctkport.org/makestonesoup/ for dates) by whoever shows up, and then distributed to our neighbors through The Food Pantry and Ozaukee Food Alliance.

Monthly Ministry

Christ the King is a generous congregation! This year, we've worked to focus our impact as a church by featuring one ministry each month. No one is expected to give to all of them, but our hope is that each person in our church will find something they're passionate about and willing to support.



For our monthly ministries so far this year, we've had guest speakers from ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission, Breaking the Chains Prison Congregation, Crossways Camping Ministries, and the Mount Meru Coffee Project share with us in worship. We've supported local families in need through Lighthouse's Family Promise birthday kit project and school supplies for Ozaukee Food Alliance, provided donations and supplies for Vacation Bible School, and given money for disaster relief and world hunger.

Together, CTK has already given away well over \$3,000 in money and items this year! Thank you to everyone who has contributed to help us make a difference for our neighbors near and far. Coming up, we'll have a guest with us on September 14 from Outreach for Hope, learn more about Lutheran World Relief in October, and collect diapers and wipes for the Ozaukee Baby Bank in November. God is doing great things through your generosity!
